



Bough Beech Sailing Club Disciplinary Procedure

Bough Beech Sailing Club's disciplinary procedure applies to all members of the club and aims to ensure that all members are treated fairly and consistently regarding their conduct.

The procedure may be reviewed and amended by the General Committee (GC) from time to time to meet any change in requirements.

Principles

1. No disciplinary action will be taken until an investigation has been undertaken by a person or persons appointed by the General Committee. Investigator(s) will not be involved in any subsequent disciplinary decision.
2. Disciplinary matters will be concluded without undue delay.
3. Disciplinary matters will be treated confidentially and only those directly involved in the procedure will be informed.
4. Disciplinary matters will normally be heard by the General Committee, with a right of appeal to the members at a General Meeting.
5. The most senior, appropriate flag officer may appoint a smaller panel, the Disciplinary Committee, to conduct the hearing.
6. A member who is the subject of disciplinary action will be advised in writing of the nature of the complaint against them, will be allowed sufficient time to prepare for a disciplinary hearing, and will be given the opportunity to state their case.
7. The member will have the right to be accompanied by a fellow member, or by another representative (but not a legal representative) at the discretion of the Disciplinary Committee.
8. The member will have the right to appeal against any sanction or penalty imposed, and for that appeal to be heard by a panel of GC members not involved in the original disciplinary hearing.
9. A proper record will be kept of any disciplinary decision, considering the need for confidentiality.
10. A complainant will be informed when the matter is resolved but does not have the right to be informed of the nature of any sanction or penalty imposed.

Examples of misconduct offences include but are not limited to the following: -

- a. Failure to comply with club rules, byelaws, regulations, policies or codes of conduct, including health and safety and safeguarding policies.
- b. Failure to pay membership subscriptions, boat fees or other monies owed to the club within a reasonable time.



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- c. Theft or misappropriation of club assets or property
- d. Deliberate damage to the property of the club or a member.
- e. Assault on or deliberate injury to a member, guest or employee.
- f. Foul, abusive or discriminatory language, behaviour or harassment.
- g. Harming or placing at risk of harm a child or young person aged under 18 or a vulnerable person.
- h. Conduct, whether within or outside the club, which might bring it into disrepute by association.

The Procedure

Receipt of complaint

1. A complaint is received by the club and passed to the Hon Secretary and acknowledged.
2. The Hon Secretary informs the General Committee that a complaint has been received which appoints a suitably qualified person to investigate it. Such person may not be a current member of the club.
3. If the presence at the club of the member who is the subject of the complaint may put others at risk, their membership and/or attendance may be suspended, pending the investigation and the outcome of any subsequent disciplinary hearing.

Investigation

4. The matter is investigated; this may include speaking to the complainant and gathering statements from any witnesses. In the event of failure making a payment, it may involve checking the club's financial records.
5. If, during the investigation, it appears that the member may have committed a criminal offence, this may be reported to the Police, and the internal disciplinary procedure will be put on hold until any Police investigation and subsequent prosecution has been concluded.

Hearing

6. If relevant, the most senior, appropriate flag officer appoints a 3-person Disciplinary Committee. The primary aim will be to appoint from the current GC members but, in some circumstances, the most senior, appropriate flag officer may choose to involve non-BBSC members, but excluding any member who is related to either the complainant or the member who is the subject of the complaint, and any member who has been involved in a previous disciplinary action involving the same member. The person or persons who conducted the investigation may be asked to present the case on behalf of the club.
7. The date, time and venue for the disciplinary hearing are decided, allowing sufficient time for



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the member to prepare his case.

8. The member is informed in writing of the nature of the complaint, is asked to attend the disciplinary hearing, informed of their right to be accompanied and provided with copies of this procedure, any relevant documents and witness statements.
9. If the member is unable, for good reasons, to attend on the appointed date, the Disciplinary Committee should endeavour to agree a suitable alternative date. If the member is unable to agree a mutually acceptable date within a reasonable period, the hearing may take place in their absence.
10. The disciplinary hearing takes place.



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11. No witnesses or statements should be introduced at the hearing without prior notice and copies of all written evidence must be produced for consideration prior to the hearing, to be available in advance to the parties.
12. The Disciplinary Committee may, if it considers it fair to do so, adjourn the hearing to allow further evidence to be referred to.

Decision

13. The Disciplinary Committee decides whether misconduct has taken place, and if so, decides on an appropriate and proportionate sanction or penalty. If the Disciplinary Committee recommends that a member should be suspended (temporary) or expelled (permanent) from the club, this must be ratified by a two thirds majority vote by the General Committee in accordance with Bough Beech Sailing Club Rule 8.
14. After the Disciplinary Committee has reached a decision, the subject of the complaint will be notified in writing of such decision and informed of any penalties within 7 days of the decision being reached, penalties will be effective from the date of the decision. If relevant, the member should be informed of his right to appeal and the timescales involved.
15. A record is made of the disciplinary decision.

Appeal

16. If the member appeals, the matter is referred either to the members at a General Meeting or to a panel of General Committee members who were not involved in the original hearing. The Appeal Committee will be appointed by the most senior, appropriate flag officer. The appeal decision is final.

Conclusion

17. The complainant is informed that the matter has been concluded.



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Appeals

An appeal may be made on the following grounds: -

- a. the club has failed to follow a fair process; and/or
- b. the member feels that the sanction is disproportionate to the offence

If an appeal is to be made then written notice of appeal by way of an electronic mail or 1st class recorded delivery to the Secretary must be given by the member, within 28 days of being notified of the decision. No appeal will be valid or considered after that period has elapsed. The member must give full written grounds for the appeal, stating exactly what is being appealed against and the reasons.

An appeal hearing will be convened as soon as practicable and will consist of an Appeal Committee of 3 members who did not take part in the first hearing and who will elect their own Chairperson who will have the casting vote.

New evidence cannot be presented at the appeal hearing. The Appeal Committee shall have power to uphold the original decision, reverse it, or reduce the penalty but may not increase it.

The decision of the Appeal Committee is final and binding on the parties
